

## The Dalles Is Favored as 1935 Convention City

Lee Schwab Campaigns for Dept. Of Oregon Legion Meeting

American Legion posts at Maupin, Dufur and Mosier in Wasco county are displaying an active support of The Dalles Post No. 19, in making a bid for the 1935 convention of the department of Oregon at the Wasco county capital. The Dufur post is taking a lead in carrying the invitation of The Dalles post to this area of the state. Lee M. Schwab, past commander of the Vernonia post, spent Saturday in Vernonia, renewing friendships and telling the story of the advantages of holding the 1935 State Legion convention at The Dalles.

Mr. Schwab cites that The Dalles Legionnaires have the active cooperation of not only the American Legion Auxiliary organizations of all Wasco county but that every service club, the chamber of commerce, civic bodies and city and county officials in extending their invitation for the convention.

"The Dalles," Mr. Schwab says, "is one of the most historic of Pacific northwest cities, located at the end of the Old Oregon Trail. It is a region of pleasant climate, where housing facilities will be adequate to care for the maximum estimate of attendance. Entertainment features will be provided for the most varied tastes. Its geographical location and main highway routes will make The Dalles a point of convenient assemblage from all cities of the state.

"The Dalles post has adopted the slogan, 'Hi Pals!! Nineteen Thirty-Five, The Dalles!!' Joined by delegations from other mid-Columbia and eastern Oregon posts and headed by The Dalles post's drum and bugle corps, that post will invade Astoria, this year's convention city, in force in late August."

Mr. Schwab says that The Dalles post the past ten years has developed a community celebration, known as the Old Fort Dalles Frolics and in commemoration of the picturesque and colorful days when The Dalles was a frontier United States army post and the chief city east of the Cascade mountains, into a recreation institution for eastern Oregon and the mid-Columbia country. Plans call for an expansion of this entertainment feature as

a high light of the state convention.

The Dufur editor and former Vernonia post commander calls attention to the recent activity in Columbia river development, which has resulted in construction of the Bonneville dam, the initial step in a vast program which will bring about a realization of the hydro-electric and navigation asset of the great river. While he cites that The Dalles has never been a "river town," the initiation of the new development has made the population there more water minded than ever, and today The Dalles citizens are optimistic over a favorable decision to their appeal to the United States army engineers for immediate inclusion of marine locks in Bonneville dam. The construction of such locks will permit ocean-going vessels to enter the 47-mile ship channel, which will be created upstream from the dam and enable ships of maximum tonnage to dock at The Dalles. Mr. Schwab cites that an inspection of Bonneville dam will form an interesting feature for all delegations who may visit The Dalles next year from this area.

### SERA SUSPENDS UNTIL MONDAY, AUGUST 6

SERA projects in Columbia county were shut down yesterday for the remainder of July, the work allotment of two weeks which is allowed each man, having been finished.

Repairing and remodeling the interior of the city hall at Rainier has been completed this week.

Clatskanie Boy Scout camp project and Vernonia school library are projects to be resumed when SERA work starts August 6. Columbia Heights school project has been approved and will be started as soon as approval is received.

### NEEDY STUDENTS TO GET WORK AID THROUGH SERA

CORVALLIS — Federal funds for assisting students of Oregon colleges through labor relief will again be available for the coming year, according to notification received by E. B. Lemon, registrar at Oregon State college. Funds for a limited number of students will be distributed through the state emergency relief administration.

The percentage quota will permit 224 student to obtain aid not to exceed \$20 a month and an average of not more than \$15 a month. Half of those receiving this work must not have been in any college or university last January. Applications are being received now by Registrar Lemon from those who would not be able to attend or continue in college without such aid. Character and scholastic records are considered.
