COUNTY AGENT DESCRIBES FLEE BEETLE CONTROL

"Attacks of potato flea beetle have been quite severe in most of the communities of the county," states G. A. Nelson, county agent.

"These flea beetle, however, can be controlled when dusted properly with calcium arsenate, one part, and hydrated lime, four parts," Mr. Nelson states. It is important, however, that the dust be applied as soon as the beetle are noticed on the potato vines or other vegetables. This should be repeated about every ten days until the flea beetle have been brought under control.

"The flea beetle come into "from the fence rows or other vegetation, so that the dusting may only need to be confined to the edges of the patches to control them. However, this point can only be judged by careful examination of the plants on the edge of the field and those further towards the middle to determine their numbers on these plants. On examining a potato field recently it was found that there was quite a lot of beetle on one edge of the field even though it had been recently dusted. Close examination disclosed that there were lots of dead beetle on the ground and that the live beetle working on the plants were new infestations coming in from the side of the field. So while there may be flea beetle appearing on the potatoes even after they are dusted it may not mean that they are not being killed by proper dusting with the arsenate dust and that it is important to repeat the dusting at least every ten days to keep down the new infestation and also the new
