

Welcome for Camp Visitors Seems Dubious

Company Is Quarantined Because Of Measles Case

CAMP REEHER'S, CCC, Westimber, Aug. 9—(Special)—Visitors at the Reeher's CCC camp met with a dubious welcome this week. A quarantine placed on the camp Monday decreed—as is usually the case with quarantines—that visitors stayed permanently for the period of the confinement order, otherwise there was no entrance.

A case of illness diagnosed by the camp physician as measles led to the quarantine order, duration of which was placed according to law under authority of the Washington county health officer.

Despite the single case of contagious disease, little more than the usual minor indispositions afflicted the camp, forestry and other work proceeding as usual. One effect of the quarantine, however, was to prevent the usual visits of SERA teachers to camp as well as cessation of the customary Tuesday night inspirational and religious program that has been conducted under the direction of Rev. A. G. Bennett of Forest Grove.

Camp Improvement activities again this week marked one phase of the work program for the conservation corps enrollees.

Athletic Field Planned

Plans were laid for the preparation of an athletic field immediately east of camp on a plot that this summer was used for raising hay. Fences will be removed from the tract measuring 65 by 115 yards and ground will be prepared for permanent use as an athletic field through cooperative arrangements made by the army, forestry department and W. F. Brinkmeyer, land owner.

It was agreed that the field could be used as an athletic area during the period the camp remains at Westimber. In return, camp officials have agreed to clear a similar tract of land for Brinkmeyer to replace the converted hay field.

Side Camps Inspected

Added evidence of the care and emphasis placed on hygiene and general cleanliness in federally controlled organizations developed at Camp Reeher's with the inauguration of regular inspections of side camps occupied by personnel of Company 1313. Heretofore, during the press of construction activities and camp organization, side and detachment camps were under no regular inspection schedule although frequent trips were made by camp officers to insure adequate safeguards.

Under the new routine the inspecting officer is required to make a thorough survey, covering the main points touched in the usual weekly inspections at the main camp at Westimber. High spots in the regular check ups comprise the mess hall and equip-

ment, barracks or tents, latrines, bath houses, camp exchange and general police of area.

Items receiving the most critical scrutiny are floors, tables, cooking utensils, cleanliness and general appearance, garbage disposal, beds and bunks, sanitary precautions and general police or maintenance.

Ratings of the various points of inspection are made as "unsatisfactory, satisfactory, excellent or superior."

Personnel at Full Strength

Personnel of Company 1313 was again at full strength this week with the return of several enrollees from Camp Withycombe where they had been called as result of Governor Meier's order for mobilization of the national guard during the recent strike troubles at Portland.
