ON OREGON FARMS

CORVALLIS — Damage by squash bugs has been reported to the O.S.C. experiment station here from southern Oregon, the Willamette valley and the vicinity of Ontario this year, according to Dr. Don C. Mote, entomologist, and in past years considerable damage has been done by this pest along the upper Columbia river territory near Hermiston. The squash bug differs from most of the large insects that infest gardens, Dr. Mote says, in that it has piercing mouth parts and sucks the juice of plants, feeding extensively on gourds, melons, pumpkins and squash. They have also been found in enormous quantities on the so-called "Man in the ground." Because of their sucking habits they can be killed only by contact sprays, and recent tests indicate that the pyrethrum spray known as Pyroicide 20, applied according to directions on the can, will kill the insects when applied to them. Several pyrethrum sprays are on the market under various commercial names, such as Evergreen 20, Red Arrow and others. Evergreen 20 is said to have the same toxic constituents as Pyroicide 20 which was used in the tests.
