# **Pasteurized**

## Is Not Cooked or Boiled Milk

Pasteurized milk is natural cow's milk, subjected for a period of not less than 30 minutes, to a temperature of not less than 140 degrees, nor more than 145 degrees Fahrenheit, and immediately cooled to a temperature of 50 degrees or lower, and kept at this low temperature until delivered.

Boiling temperature is 212 degrees - a heat which changes the taste and vitamine content of milk to a slight extent.

Holding the milk at the temperature of between 140 and 145 degrees for 30 minutes destroys the germs causing diphtheria, typhoid, dysentery, septic sore throat tering the taste or food value of the milk.
