**RECORD HANG-OVER FIRE DISCOVERED**

(Forest Log)  
Hang-over fires of long duration have on rare instances been reported to the State Forester. The most recent is one that has persisted in the Tillamook burn since the disastrous fire of August, 1933. Recently Saddle Mountain lookout reported a fire in a very inaccessible part of the burn. Two men were sent in to put the fire out. They discovered a hemlock snag about three feet in diameter and 15 feet high with smoke emerging from the top. The snag was felled and when it hit the ground a flowing mass of red-hot material resembling slag rolled out. The men extinguished the fire and after the slag had cooled, loaded a quantity of it into a pack sack and carried it out to the Forest Grove Patrol headquarters. Later some of it was sent to the State Forester's office in Salem.
