

Republican County Group Adopts Platform

Expenditures of Government Are Condemned

The republican central committee of Columbia county adopted at its meeting August 18 the following resolutions.

"The Republican county central committee of Columbia county, having firmly in mind the distressed economic conditions prevailing in our country, and which have extended to Oregon and Columbia county, declare their allegiance to the principle that these conditions must be relieved through administration of government which reflects the just demands of a majority of our people.

"We do not believe that the mere expenditure of billions of public funds which must be secured from taxation that will impair the savings of our children and grand children is the proper method of restoring prosperity and confidence.

We declare our belief in the principle that this government must so administer its affairs that every citizen should be provided with an opportunity to work at reasonable hours and for a fair and just wage, and that industry and commerce should be encouraged to conduct its affairs to the end that it may furnish a maximum amount of employment.

"We deplore the present trend towards secrecy in the ultimate object of government in social legislation. We feel this uncertainty is a decided factor retarding the employment of private funds in commerce and industry.

"With the desire that Oregon is entitled to have a progressive government that will be responsive to the public interest, we strongly urge the election in November of this year of Joe E. Dunne, who has been nominated by the Republican party in a free and open primary, and who, by his long legislative experience as state senator from Columbia county, is well fitted to succeed as the chief executive of this state. His sympathetic understanding of the problems of the farm and dairy industry; his close connection with labor, dating from his membership in a labor union; his humble origin and his early struggles for advancement; his sacrifices for the welfare of the people, and his energy and vigorous mentality all combine to make him an ideal candidate to meet the temper of the times.

"We recognize the necessity of accomplishing the reduction of property taxes, and a marked decrease in the costs of government, which are out of all proportion to the public purse and average income.

"We believe government is on a parity with the experience and capacity of those entrusted with its administration, and in the selection of our public officials we should not be misled by those who would plunge the state into a

huge sea of indebtedness for the promotion of unsound schemes that would be bound to increase the burden of taxation.

"We pledge our faith to the doctrine of orderly progress, and we recommend to the electorate of Columbia county that they carefully consider the claims and qualifications of the various candidates, district, county, legislative and state, to the end that we may obtain the most efficient selections, those best qualified to impose proper economy and efficiency in the administration of our affairs."

The resolutions committee consisted of Edwin Ross, chairman, N. M. Blumensadt, C. E. Culbertson and J. G. Watts.
