### PETITIONS SIGNED FOR BEER SALE VOTE IN FOREST GROVE

(Forest Grove News-Times) A petition for a local option election on the question of the sale of beer is now being circulated in Forest Grove. The petition requests that an election be held on November 6 for the purpose of prohibiting the sale of all alcoholic liquors containing more than five per cent of alcohol by weight.

The ultimate result of the measure, if approved will be to prohibit the sale of hard liquors but authorizing the sale of beer in all forms. At the present time beer is being sold only in original packages for consumption off the premises. Draft beer would be possible under the proposed measure.

The Nehalem valley was apparently under control today, according to information received from Camp Boyington.

The fire broke out Saturday and 80 men were rushed from the CCC camp to battle the blaze. Because of the low humidity late Saturday and Sunday, the flames spread rapidly and covered an area of about 150 acres. Ninety CCC men battled the blaze Sunday and eventually succeeded in establishing fire guards which 30 men were able to hold safely today. More favorable humidity reports today indicated the danger was past unless the humidity drops as it did yesterday. Four or five farms were endangered for a while but were saved.
