For labor \$4,598,307.57 70.45%
For material 1,610,397.07 24.67%
For administration 318,500.01 4.88%

From the above audited report of the Oregon CWA for the period of its existence, it is quite apparent that Mr. Treharne's figures of "80 per cent to some republican bureau and 20 per cent to the men" are all haywire. Instead of 20 per cent, labor received 70.45 per cent and instead of 80 per cent, administration cost less than five per cent. The 25 per cent that went for materials meant jobs for men in cement plants, lumber mills, stone quarries, etc., and consequently was spent in carrying out the explicit purpose of the administration in setting up the CWA, namely: to provide the citizenry with income.

It must be apparent to any fair minded citizen that Mr. Treharne is guilty either of gross misrepresentation or that he has been made the victim of a parti-
