Vernonia Wins From Banks 104 to 0 Fri.

**Fine Blocking on Line Gives
Backfield Splendid Chances**

Vernonia swamped Banks 104 to 0 Friday in the most thrilling football game that Vernonia's old field ever dreamed of. Banks arrived full of fight and prepared for a tough drag. When Vernonia's team stepped out a cry went up from Banks' team inquiring where were all the big guys? Well, all I can say is that they found out.

The two teams prepared for battle. Gunther, captain for Banks won the toss and elected to kick, while Raney, captain for Vernonia, chose the upper end of the field, and the battle was on.

Holcomb took the kick off and ran it back about 25 yards where he was downed by Savanni of Banks on Banks' 30 yard line. From then on the game was a chaos. Magnificent blocking in the line gave the backfield its chance to shine and shine it did. Within the first two minutes of the game scores were made to break the morale of the Banks crew. Touchdown after touchdown was run over Banks right tackle until finally the attack shifted to end runs and line plunges out of sheer mercy for the tackle.

At the beginning of the third quarter Coach McCrae substituted several men who themselves were not so bad and who played a fine game as some of them were playing in their first quarter of football. Howard and Henderson played spectacular football when coming down the field with the ball, constant drive, terrific force and the old straight arm brought victory in the shape of touchdown after touchdown. We must compliment Henderson on his power drives because he has the power and the will to use it; Howard is to be envied for his speedy plays down a broken field, he has the power to drive but he is loathe to use it. Drive, Howard, drive. To sage quarterback Holcomb we owe the game itself for, though his excellent blocking and wise calling of plays we were able to concentrate our power and to make a hole in the line where there wasn't one.

To "Smash" Lamping and "Dukes" Overson we owe the destruction of Banks' offensive tactics for their combined talents held off tackle plays for occasional losses and no gain.

To Lamarr Sandyes and Sonny Schalock at guards and Raney, captain, at center, we owe the honor of holding all center smashes for no gain; to these last men we owe several touchdowns for through their excellent blocking, Holcomb, Howard and Henderson were able to make several otherwise impossible touchdowns.

To King and Adams, ends, we owe the failure of Banks to run back any punts or kickoffs because when the ball left the foot of the kicker these men were down the field and the man who received the punt had no chance at all to make any yardage.

We would like to mention the names of a few others who played on the team: Stanley Parker, Bobby King, quarterbacks; Carl Jensen, guard; Ed Baker, at end, and Elmo Aldridge played fine ball too.

The children of today are a carefree, happy-go-lucky group. Some of them, at heart, are bad or mean but these are very few and for the most part hard to find; most children up to the age of 21 are not subjected to any definite form of responsibility and for this reason, when they are, they fail to recognize the real seriousness of their positions. Nine times out of ten, the youngster just graduating into manhood has no thought in his head save for a good time and he does not care who pays the price of a moment's pleasure, whether it is himself or some other individual for whom he may care or whom he may hate. Due to his lack of funds he may indulge in a gambling orgy or he may go to some town or city where he is unknown and commit a crime of some sort to secure a little money for a splurge or a good time. Blame him not so much as you should blame circumstances and his parents. Never having been taught the value of money save in dollars and cents, he knows not what he does, he little realizes that the money he steals may be the price of a meal, a home or his character.

Then when he is apprehended and convicted and if he receives a sentence he immediately becomes soured on the world: get this: "Society owes not any man a living, but at this very moment society is supporting millions of degraded, perhaps demented, individuals whose pursuit of "easy" money led them to forget their ingrained decency and honesty so far as to sink to a lower level than the beasts of the forest who at least have a definite reason for their act.

The home is the place to train a child, not a pool hall or gambling joint. Take your child in hand

ere he takes you, for when he takes you, calamity is staring you in the face. This editorial is not a farce, it is a warning to you to care for your child before it is too late.
