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Rod-Gun Club **Holds Banquet** In I.O.O.F. Hall

OCCASION IS MEMORABLE

Feature Address Is Given by Dr. Irving Vining Of Ashland

The annual banquet of the Nehalem Rod and Gun club, pronounced by Chairman Matt Corrigan of the state game commission as the largest and finest of its kind which the commission has ever attended during its term of office, was a memorable occasion. The Odd Fellows hall was well filled, about 125 being present.

The address of Dr. Irving E. Vining of Ashland, a member of the commission, was outstanding. and to say that it was one of the most eloquent ever delivered in Vernonia would not be an overstatement. To attempt to reduce to cold print the substance of the address would not do justice to it, for to appreciate the fervor of his manner, the charm of his delivery and the poetic beauty of his language one must have heard it.

His theme was the need for conservation of wild life in order that men, by spending their leisure in the great out of doors might live broader and happier lives. He pictured, by way of contrast, life in the slums, told of men whose souls were seared with business cares, and narrated an incident of the catching of possibly the last of the brook trout in a tannery polluted stream in the east-where a couple of "shiners" were all that a boy could expect to catch, and good fishing was a memory for older people to talk about. Oregon, he asserted, is the last recreational center, which should be preserved for the men and women of the

Mr. Corrigan, who preceded Dr. Vining on the program, explained what the ten year program of the present game commission meant to outlying communities, the Nehalem valley getting more recognition in the past three and a half years than in the previous ten years. He declared that game and fish development through the help of government funds matched with game commission funds had stepped forward more than 20 years, fully justifying the deficit thus created.

Other members of the commission, Dr. L. E. Hibbard of Burns and Carl D. Silver of Baker, also spoke briefly, and Frank B. Wire, state game commissioner, expressed the opinion that Columbia county has without a doubt two of the best sportsmen's organizations in the state.

Music was furnished by Leo Ludwig and Charles McNutt. E. S. Bollinger, president of the club, presided.

Venison for the banquet was provided by Ross Duncan, who was presented with a pair of stainless steel knives made by the
