## Vernonia Wins At Scappoose By Good Score

Shows Same Driving Spirit As Against Banks

Vernonia high school's high scoring football team dispelled all doubt as to its ability to score against good opposition, and showing the same fighting spirit, and hard driving offensive that rolled them over Banks high 104 to 0 a week before, shattered the defense of the powerful Scappoose team to win by 26 to 0 at Scappoose Friday afternoon.

A large group of Vernonia rooters accompanying the team to Scappoose went wild when they saw the Vernonia team take the kick-off and unleash a sustained offense which carried them over the Scappoose goal line in the first few minutes of play. They saw the Vernonia boys continue this offense "under wraps," by order of Coach Wallace McCrae, when scouts from St. Helens were noticed in the crowd. With their pet plays held in reserve the boys were handicapped but continued to drive over three more touchdowns, one in each of the second, third and fourth periods.

The Scappoose team although outweighing the local boys were unable to get their offensive started against the hard charging Vernonia line.

Scappoose plainly watching the wide runs of Dave Howard opened up their inner defense to allow Henderson and Meeker to drive in repeatedly for long gains inside the tackles. The defensive work of Holcomb against forward passes was outstanding. Holly intercepted two and ran them both for touchdowns but one of his runs was called back as he stepped out of bounds.

On the line Captain Earl King and Lamping stood out. They were in the Scappoose backfield all afternoon and caused their offense plenty of trouble.

Referee Johnny Biancone former Oregon State star, remarked to Vernonia fans after the game of the fine sportsmanship and hard blocking of the Vernonia team. Only one penalty was inflicted on the Vernonia team in the course of the game.

Vernonia fans were especially impressed by the fine, fiery spirit shown by the whole team throughout the game. The improvement over last week's showing was very evident, the boys tackled harder, blocked harder and ran what few plays they used with more drive and better timing.
