Mrs. E. H. Washburn returned Monday evening after visiting relatives in Seattle, Wenatchee and Kettle Falls, Wash.

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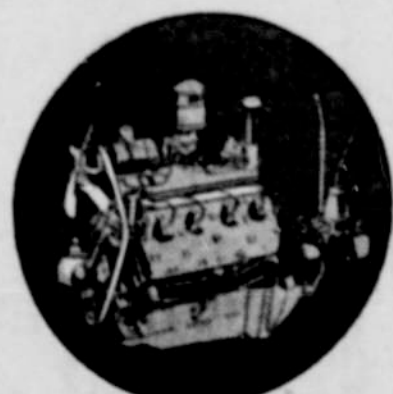
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
