COUNTY FARMERS PROTEST CORN-HOG PROGRAM FOR 1935

With a very light vote being cast, Columbia county farmers in a meeting at Mist Tuesday and Rainier Wednesday expressed themselves as opposed to a corn-hog program for 1935. The total vote was 14 against and four for the program. A proposition for a combined grain and livestock program for 1936 met with equal disfavor, there being 16 against, and two for. Only six attended at Mist and 12 at Rainier.

Opposition, believes Geo. A. Nelson, county agent, was based on the way the corn-hog program was handled in this state, there being much dissatisfaction with the cutting down of allotments. The vote will have no effect on the continuance of the program, the different states affected showing a majority for it. In Oregon

Details of Godwin Death Received Here In Newspaper Article

Details of the death of Frank Godwin, former sawyer in the O.-A. mill in Vernonia, near Klamath Falls October 2 were received here this week in an article clipped from a Klamath Falls newspaper.

He was killed in an accident at the Union Lumber company's plant 25 miles east of Bonanza when a slab from the saw struck him as he stepped from the log deck to the carriage. The slab crushed his chest and he fell from the carriage, fracturing his skull.

He was a native of Louisiana, 52 years of age. He is survived by one daughter, Billie Mae of Port Arthur, Texas. After his death an insurance policy setting up a \$10,000 trust fund for the child was found among his belongings.

Services were held in Klamath Falls October 4, and interment was in Lake Charles, La.

Additional purchases of drouth cattle, in excess of the original quotas which expired in September, have been authorized in Washington as a "tapering off" process. Oregon has been allotted \$63,374 in this cleanup buying which will purchase about 4500 head additional. State directors in charge of the cattle buying have been authorized to purchase cattle only from producers clearly unable to provide adequate feed supplies for their stock.

Oregon wheat farmers used nearly half of their contracted acres as additional fallow land, according to a survey made of 26 states including Oregon. The figures gathered by the AAA show for Oregon 46.6 per cent of the land left out of wheat used for fallow; 23.3 per cent was in new seedings for pasture or hay, slightly more than 20 per

cent lay completely idle, and 13 per cent was used for food and feed production for home use. Less than two per cent was devoted to weed control and other miscellaneous uses.
