Pasteurization Is a Safeguard to the Public Health

Milk is absolutely essential to the physical development of growing children and the health of adults; this is now a fully determined fact. Inasmuch as milk is a vital food for which there is no adequate substitute, it is imperative that safe milk be available at all times for the public.

Proper pasteurization of milk, defined by the United States Department of Agriculture and Boards of Health of various cities and states, is the process by which milk is held for thirty minutes at temperatures ranging from 142° to 145° Fahrenheit and thereafter immediately cooled.

Proper pasteurization destroys any pathogenic organisms which might be present in milk, such as streptococci and those bacteria causing tuberculosis, typhoid, scarlet fever and diptheria. Surveys have definitely proved that pasteurization has very largely reduced the infantile death rate caused by intestinal disturbances. On the other hand, the natural helpful organisms, such as the lactic acid bacteria, present in milk, are not all destroyed by proper pasteurization. -National Dairy Council
