Oregon factories and Oregon products as a means of creating work and building payrolls and increasing demand for raw products," says manager Baker. "The results of the campaign have been amazing to many of our manufacturing plants and the economic result is being widely felt. Already the public support has created additional jobs and put additional money in circulation in Oregon.

"Prior to the campaign, the salesmen in cooperation with merchants throughout the state, filled the shelves of stores with Oregon-made merchandise and products. This immediately reduced the surplus in the manufacturing plants and they went to work to replenish their stocks. During the campaign, the store shelves were largely cleaned out of Oregon goods and again the stocks must be replenished. This means that the mills and factories already have had to increase forces.

"The state did a good job of "Selling Oregon to Ourselves" and the result will be lasting. The campaign was only the beginning. It is certain that from this point forward, the Oregon-made goods will receive attention ahead of those imported from elsewhere not only because the quality and prices are the same, but because such buying gives manufacturing an impetus, and
