High School Wins From Town Team In Ball Tournament

In the playoff for the cellar position of the basketball tournament Friday the high school hoopsters won a well-earned 32-23 victory over the Town team.

The high school boys seemed much improved over their previous night's showing. They rolled up an early lead and held it until the third quarter, when the Town quintet pulled ahead 19-18. At the end of the first quarter Vernonia high was ahead 11-4. During the next quarter the Town team threw in baskets from every angle of the floor to narrow down the lead to a small margin for the high school.

At the start of the second half, the Town team took the lead for the first and only time of the game, but their opponents soon caught up. During the final period the Town team was held to two field goals while the high school hoopsters tallied eight more points. At the final whistle the Town team found themselves on the short end of a 32-23 score.

Adams, high school center, received the honor of high point man with 10 points to his credit. Gordon, town team, and King, high school, were next with nine points each.
