Eight Teams Are to Enter Tournament In Astoria 7th-9th

Eight teams are to be entered in the annual district basketball tournament to be held at Astoria March 7, 8 and 9.

Astoria and Seaside will represent Clatsop county. Vernonia, St. Helens, Clatskanie, Scappoose and Rainier are entered from Columbia county.

The Vernonia Loggers will be paired against the husky Astoria Fishermen in the first game of the tournament. Astoria won both the district and state championships last year and are heavy favorites to repeat again this season. The Fishermen have the tallest center in the league, Kokka, who stands 6 ft. 4 in. in his stocking feet. The remainder of their hoopsters average 6 ft. 1 in. in height.
