J. P. McDonald of Medford, former Vernonia resident, is here visiting his brother, Bruce McDonald, and other relatives. He expects to be here until about the 15th.

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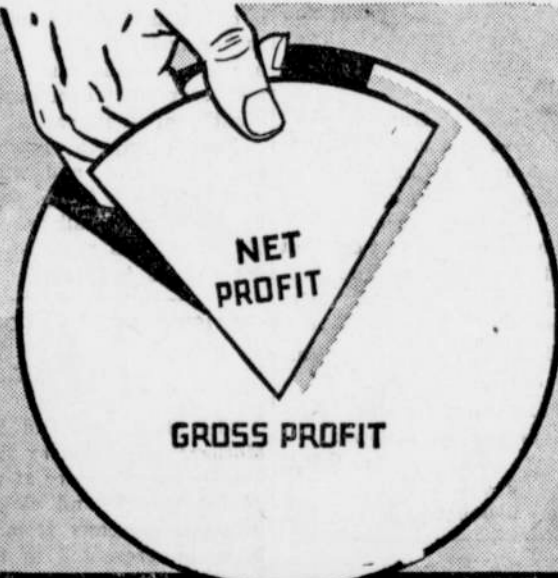
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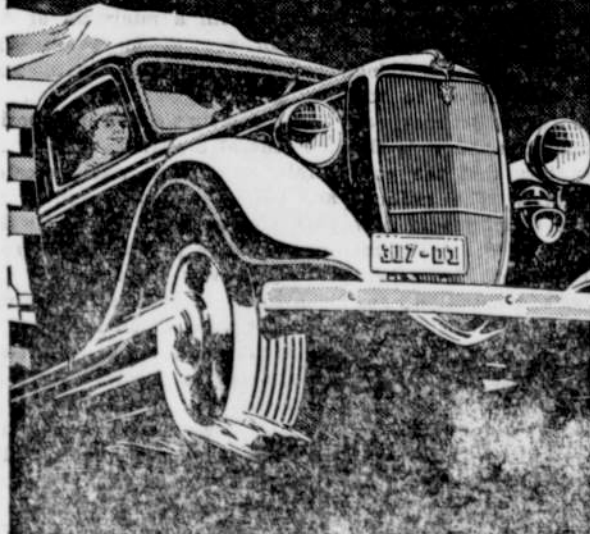
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
