Mrs. Wilburn Charlesworth and baby daughter of Medford arrived Saturday evening to spend

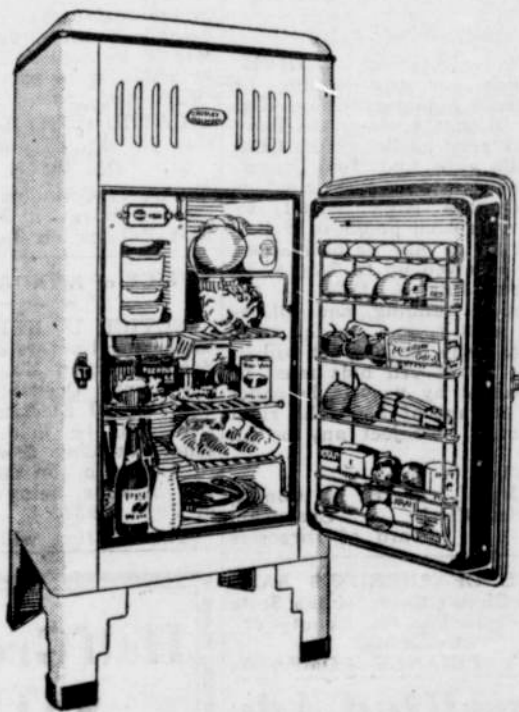
