MOTOR LAW CHANGES GO INTO EFFECT SOON

Johnny Jones, whose car crashed into another machine, injuring Mrs. Henry Smith, will not be permitted to drive again until he pays damages imposed by Judge Williams' court, and until he gives proof he can pay any damages imposed after accidents in the future.

This, in part, is the meaning of the Safety Responsibility act passed by the last Oregon state legislature and scheduled to go into effect on July 1, according to the safety department of the Oregon State Motor Association.

The law, now effecting more than 65 per cent of all motorists in the United States, is designed to promote safety on the streets and highways by eliminating the careless, irresponsible driver who heretofore had little to lose as a result of a smashup.
