

# NOTICE OF FORECLOSURE

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that under and by virtue of Ordinance No. 82 of the City of Vernonia, Columbia County, Oregon, made for the purpose of assessing the costs and expenses of a sewer constructed and completed in Sewer District Number One of said City, which said ordinance was approved by the Mayor of said City on the 17th day of July, 1924, as assessment was levied and assessed against the real property hereinafter described to pay the portions of cost and expenses of said construction accruing to said real property by reason of said improvement and the benefits derived therefrom, which property was, after due notice, then bonded by the owners thereof to be paid for as required under the Bancroft Bonding Act; that default has been made in the payment of said assessment, and the respective owners of each of said tracts have neglected and refused to pay the same aforesaid for a period of more than one year, and that the description of the property, names of the several owners, sums so assessed, date of entry, and the sums assessed against the same and remaining unpaid are as follows:

Colored lights at night enhance the loveliness of the many fountains and lakes which are special features of the landscaping. American industrial exhibits make up a large part of the exposition.

Accompanied by her niece, Barbara Dustin, Miss Owens visited for two weeks with her sister and brother-in-law in Sacramento before they went to Southern California. An interesting trip into Mexico was also enjoyed by the party.

### BUSINESS IN PORTLAND AREA SHOWS STABILITY DECLARES SURVEY ED.

Despite the unfavorable situation created by the lumber strike and uncertainty regarding pending legislation, business in the Portland area during May showed remarkable stability according to the June issue of the Commonwealth, Inc. Business Survey. Activity in industries dependent upon lumber for their source of raw material were somewhat curtailed. Furniture factories and wood-working plants closed during part of the month. Other industrial lines, however, seemed to be affected little.

Retail trade showed unexpected strength during May after a disappointing early spring and, it was thought, surpassed the corresponding 1934 month by about 10 or 15 per cent. Wholesale trade, however, was reported as being slower due to the possibility of lower prices as a result of the Supreme Court's NIRA decision. Retailers bought cautiously in anticipation of this development.

Oregon's brightest spot, said David Eccles, editor of Business Survey, is eastern Oregon. That section is less affected by the lumber strike and its trade is extremely active. Purchases, it is said, are in large measure for cash. However, Eccles believes that the undercurrent of business is strongly toward recovery at this time despite labor troubles and uncertainties.
