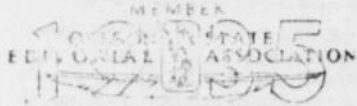

B. C. LUMBER LOADINGS SHOW INCREASE IN MAY

The lumber industry in British Columbia loaded 73 per cent of the combined shipments of mills in that province, Oregon, and Washington during May, according to the current report of the Pacific Lumber Inspection Bureau, Seattle. This is believed to be the largest proportion ever received of a month's business by the Canadian mills. The increase is believed due chiefly to the lumber strike in western Washington and western Oregon which has closed most of the cargo plants.

The total shipment of lumber from the three districts in May was 208,845,578 board feet; compared with 322,530,417 feet in April, a decrease of 112,000,000 feet or 37 per cent. Of this loss 92,000,000 was in domestic water trade of the American mills. The Oregon coast, the only American area open to shipping during the month, moved 18,000,000 in May compared with 83,000,000 in April.
