### Mill At Wauna Declares Intent of Reopening

(Astorian-Budget)

ASTORIA, June 21— Management of the Crossett-Western sawmill at Wauna announced today that the plant will resume operation on a limited scale next Monday after a shut down of eight weeks, due to the lumber strike. Notices were posted at the plant Thursday noon that applications would be received from employees on the payroll during April, 1935, and a large number at once applied for work.

The notices stated that the company will comply voluntarily with all of the wage and hour provisions of the former lumber code, except that the new base rate will be 50 cents an hour, compared with the 42½ cent code base. Wages will follow the new 4-L scale with a minimum increase of five cents per hour to every man, and a 40 hour week will be in effect.

**No Discrimination**  
The management states that there will be no discrimination against union members or members of other groups and that they may all have their positions back. The company also restates its willingness to meet with any number or groups of employees to discuss working conditions. While only certain portions of the plant will open Monday the management expects the entire crew of 200 to be back at work in the near future.

The company's logging operation at Knappa may also resume this summer if fire hazard conditions permit. There are already several weeks run of logs in store in the river. Loggers will be offered work in the same basis as the proposal to the mill hands.

**Westport Silent**

port Lumber company which operates the large Westport mill a few miles from Wauna has as yet in announced no plan to resume operation and the Bradwood mill has a notice posted that operation will not be resumed this summer.

### TAX TURNOVER OF \$27,000 IS MADE

Turnover of \$27,669.60 to Gladys Peterson, county treasurer, on current taxes was reported yesterday by the collection department of the sheriff's office on taxes collected during the latter part of the second quarter of 1935, ending June 15. Included among the largest payers were the Charles R. McCormick Lumber company, S. P. & S. railroad, and Clark & Wilson.

In the division of the above amount, \$9,712.85 is a portion of the state tax due; \$1,648.01 will go for county school, old age pension and general county funds and the balance is for road districts, schools, draining districts, cities, fire patrol, union high schools, and high school tuition.

A turnover of taxes collected on delinquent years' rolls is expected to be made about July 1.
