\$163.00 Profit Is Outcome of Air Show Here

TOTAL RECEIPTS COME TO \$653.14

Several Donations Received From Various Sources

A profit of \$163.88 was turned over this week to the Vernonia chamber of commerce by the airport committee as the outcome of the dedication celebration September 21 and 22. The accounts, as audited yesterday by Loel Roberts, show the following receipts: queen contest, \$260.30; Saturday gate, \$68.60; Sunday gate, \$194.00. Gift from Western Dairy Products Co., \$10.00; from Shell Oil Co., \$10.00; from U. S. bakery, \$5.00; from Royal Soda Works of Hillsboro, \$5.00; Mrs. Ann Lord, \$10.00; concessions, peanut wagon, \$2.50; soda pop and sandwiches, \$69.40; sale of meat, \$5.39; fees from airplane rides, \$12.95. Total receipts were \$653.14. Expenditures were \$489.26.

All meat remaining unsold was donated to needy families.

Vernonia Is Victor Over Banks 48-0

Opponents Are Unable to Withstand Loggers' Offense

County Institute Thursday to Be Open to Public

The Columbia county teachers' institute is to be held next Thursday in the St. Helens high school building. Among the speakers will be Dr. B. Baxter, president of the Willamette university, D. A. Emerson of the state superintendent's office, Dr. D. D. Poling of Albany and Robert Krohn, physical education director of the Portland public schools, who will have charge of physical education demonstration. The meetings will be open to the general public as well as to the teachers.

Friday will be visiting day, so that there will be no school in the county for the last two days of the week.

Football Team Organized at Camp Reehers

Camp Reehers, CCC, Westimber, (Special). Football is taking the same grip on the "forest university" of Camp Reehers, CCC, as on almost all other organizations throughout the county.

Twenty men turned out in suits this week in response to the first practice call issued Monday by Lt. John J. Taggart, company commander and football coach. Practice sessions will be held daily, after 4 o'clock following work hour.

Although the game schedule has not yet been worked up, arrangements for contests with nearby schools are under way. Many dates, however, are still open on the company schedule.

Football equipment for the camp was secured through the cooperation of Jefferson high school of Portland, and Tualatin and Vernonia high schools. Individual contributions by members also have helped.

Coach Taggart hopes to organize a strong team as many of the men turning out have had several years experience as players on various high school teams.

In addition to football, a number of other activities are included on the recreational and educational schedule for camp.

Re-organization of a camp musical organization under the direction of Mrs. Warren Hale of Timber has resulted in numerous rehearsals. Many camp members are studying either individually or in small groups a wide range of subjects including auto mechanics, diesel engines, photography, journalism, forestry, art and salesmanship. A class of 26 men will soon be ready to take the examination required for qualification for the standard Red Cross course in First Aid. The class has been conducted under the direction of Warren Hale, camp surgeon.

The fire was confined to logged off land and did no damage. The house of E. Sessman was protected by backfiring. Humidity was so low, however, during the day that the consequences might easily have been serious.
