**Class in Band
Music to Start
Under Bandmaster**

In compliance with many requests a new class in band music is to be started by C. R. Watts, bandmaster. Since the present band was started last February with about 20 members it has grown to 38, and at one time it numbered 41, three having moved away. A few who started late found it too hard and had to drop out. Many of them will begin again in the new class and be able to keep up, Mr. Watts believes.

Before starting, all students from the fifth to the eighth grades will be given an aptitude test in rhythm and pitch to determine the boys and girls most likely to succeed on the band instruments. Separate arrangements will be made with boys and girls from the high school and from the Pleasant Hill school.

It is planned to give these tests in time for the instruments to be secured and practice started right after the first of the year. It will not be necessary to buy instruments to start with.
