Vernonia Townsend Club Organizes New Group at Timber, Or.

The Vernonia Townsend club organized a new Townsend club at Timber Sunday afternoon, with 40 new members. Arthur Moore of Monmouth, state congressional district organizer, addressed the meeting and assisted with organization. A large number of Vernonia Townsend members attended, also guests from Buxton and other towns.

C. C. C. TROOPERS TO VIE FOR TUITION PRIZE

Camp Reehers, CCC, Westminister, (Special)— The Christmas stocking of some CCC trooper at Camp Reehers will include a gift worth \$150.

Award of a one year tuition scholarship to Pacific university, Forest Grove, will be made to the Reehers member who has demonstrated outstanding initiative and industry in the camp educational program and who has made a satisfactory work record during his enrollment period, announced Lauri Pernu, camp educational adviser.

Selection of the qualifying enrollee, to be made by Pernu and an advisory committee including Lt. John J. Taggart, company commander, and Ross Meeker, forestry project superintendent, will be prior to December 20.

Included in the All-Oregon membership of the Reehers camp are many from Vernonia and Columbia county. A majority of the forestry foremen are Vernonia residents.

Competition for the scholarship award was announced this fall as result of the cooperation of Dr. Francis Dobbs, president of Pacific. Scheduling of faculty members for lectures at camp has been another aid offered by

the university.

Encouragement given to CCC men at Reehers to use their leisure time in self-betterment is typical of companies throughout Oregon and the entire country.

Classes with an enrollment of from two to 18 men are scheduled in book-keeping, current events, social problems and mechanics, diesel engines, mathematics, music, journalism, spelling, dramatics and tap dancing.

Individual reading courses and CCC correspondence courses in subjects including forestry, salesmanship, history and many others are being taken by more than 60 men.

Teachers are enlisted from camp supervisory personnel and enrollees themselves. Although enrollment is entirely voluntary, a majority of the nearly 200 men of the company take part in some definitely educational activity during their leisure hours.

IMPROVEMENTS ON GALES CREEK ROAD ARE TO BE MADE

With the county court moving to purchase various pieces of proposed right-of-way on the Gales creek highway, first steps are being taken to meet the state program for improvement of market road facilities from Forest Grove west and north toward Timber.

Present plans call for a change in the highway through the Heisler hop yard near Gales City, in Gales City and at Watts school corner. The change in Gales City would bring the highway behind the store and filling station instead of in front on a sharp curve as now.

Improvement, besides straightening curves, will include oil surface from Forest Grove to Balm Grove and the entire project will cost \$50,000. If there are no hitches in procuring the right of way, work is expected to commence sometime in the spring and be completed as rapidly as possible. The \$50,000 is federal funds allotted to the county to be spent on other than state highways.
