TAX TURNOVER OF \$9,000 IS MADE

New Date and Amount to Be Set at Meeting

In order to take advantage of a tax turnover of about \$9,-000 the directors of Union High school district 1 voted at a spec-ial meeting last Monday to post-pont the election on funding bonds which had been scheduled for next Monday. \$18,000 in School **Bonds Canceled and** \$360 Interest Saved

Receipt of approximately \$22,-000 in tax money from the re-cent O.-A. payment enabled the county treasurer last week to buy back and cancel \$18,000 worth of bonds of School Dist-rict 47 due July 1, saving the district \$360.05 in interest for the remaining 5½ months. These bonds, held by the state treasur-er, were released by the state bond commission at a premium of \$109.53, the rate of premium being determined by the premium which the state paid for the last issue of the district's re-funding bonds. The dates for opening of bids for purchase of the funding bonds to redeem outstanding warrants of the district, author-ized at the recent election, has been set for February 8.


