SMOKE SCREEN TO MISLEAD VOTERS

Dear Editor:

All the leading newspapers of the state laid down a smoke screen to befog the real reason why the Party Bosses and the press wanted the Primary election date changed. They shed crocodile tears for the much abused voters on account of the long time between the primary and the general election. Some of them made vicious attacks upon the elected officers of farmer and labor organizations, and yet in spite of all their statewide misrepresentation the voters gave the press one of the most decided stinging rebukes that has ever been given in Oregon.

Ever since the primary election date was set in May the political racketeers and moneyed interests have tried to mislead the legislature to throw a monkey wrench in the Oregon election system, and at last they succeeded in having a bill referred to the people by the legislature after they had tried to have the legislature pass the bill without referring it to the people. It was not the honest man whose character and record would stand investigation that was worried about running for office, because of the long time between the primary and general election. It

was the crooked politician who feared the long time would bring to light some of his past record.

Both Republican and Democrat party bosses wanted the change because it would give them power to dominate and control party nominees in regard to their legislative policies. The people rightly decided not to give up any of their franchise rights to political bosses, and the power behind them, who would have profited by the change in primary election date. We now have in Oregon one of the best election systems in the United States, giving ample time for the people to investigate qualifications of the long list of candidates and the influences behind their candidacy, thus permitting all of the people to cast their ballot intelligently for those candidates who have led the battle for human welfare and the best interest of the state.

The people of the state have placed their approval upon the stand taken by the members of the legislature who have always voted against the sales tax and the change in primary election date.
