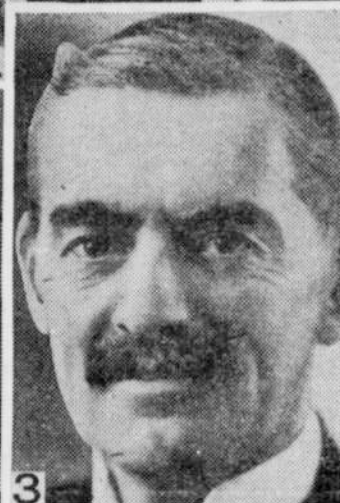

Overtime Parking Shown Up by Use of Peanuts

San Jose, Calif.—The peanut has taken its place alongside the magnifying glass, the lie detector and other implements for the detection of offenders. It was revealed here.

The plan is simplicity itself, according to George Mestressat, San Jose policeman, charged with the responsibility of detecting overtime parking of automobiles in restricted areas.

Mestressat places a peanut—preferably roasted—beneath a tire of each parked automobile when he starts his rounds.

On his way back, he examines carefully each peanut. If one has not broken, the owner of the automobile gets a tag for overtime parking.

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
