ADVISES ON CONTROL OF SPITTLE BUGS

"Spittle bugs on strawberry plants can be controlled if treated at this time with a dusting of hydrated lime," states George A. Nelson, county agent.

"About 60 to 100 pounds of lime should be applied to the acre," Mr. Nelson states. "The dusting should be thorough so that it covers all parts of the

plants so that all the places harboring spittle bugs will be treated. The treatments should be repeated again in about 10 days or two weeks."

He states further that in the second treatment when the spittle bugs are more mature, about 2 per cent nicotine should be added to the lime treatment to be most effective.

APPEAL TAKEN FROM GALES ROAD DECISION

Notice of appeal from action of the county court in approving the viewers report on values of property at Gales Creek to be used for a new highway location, was served late Wednesday on members of the court.

The appeal is brought by George C. McRobert, T. E. Heisler and Emil C. Dober through whose places the proposed new highway

will pass. McRobert asks \$2500 damages while the viewers placed the maximum damage at \$756. Dober demands \$2600 and the viewers' price is \$920, while Heisler, who loses some of his hopyard, asks \$3400. The viewers' price is \$950.
