A new ordinance establishing occupation licenses is fairly on its way through the city council, and will likely become law. It is the successor of a number of similar ordinances that have been tried a while, found unworkable, and tossed by the wayside. To condemn the measure wholly would be unfair, for much indeed may be said in its favor. The city needs the money, and there has been an obvious effort to determine the schedules according to ability to pay. To the merchant, however, it is just another tax, and Vernonia merchants are already badly overburdened with city taxes, to say nothing of school district taxes, road district taxes, county taxes and state taxes. The trouble with the occupation licenses has been that their only real purpose is that of helping out the city's finances. They give the merchant nothing that he feels that he has not already paid for. He gets no protection against competition from without or within, or anything else that he might regard as an advantage not freely accorded everybody in town. And because he pays reluctantly if at all, enforcement has been very difficult and sometimes even impossible.

When one ordinance of the kind fails, it is natural that the council should try another, readjusting some of the schedules and perhaps putting more "teeth" into the enforcing clauses. What is overlooked is the necessity of
