## "Milk Should Be Pasteurized"

The above statement is a quotation from a speech made at the Pacific North-meeting held in Portland recently by one of the famous guest physicians, Dr. David John Davis of Chicago, professor of bacteriology and dean of the medical college of the University of Illinois.

As quoted in the Morning Oregonian of July 10, part of his speech reads "Streptococcus sore throat is a dangerous thing. . . It sometimes is spread through milk, one infected cow or one milkman suffering from this disease can cause a vast amount of suffering and death.

"An epidemic hit a Wisconsin city last year. It spread rapidly, seven deaths, all from No. 4 cow in a nearby dairy. MILK SHOULD BE PASTEURIZED."

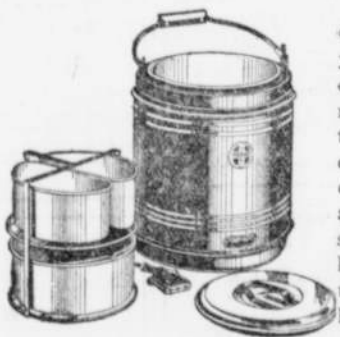
