VERNONIA CCC MEN FIND THAT LIGHTNING IS REAL

Camp Mottet Creek, CCC, Weston, (Special) Lightning and thunder, in eastern Oregon, is more than a bluff of brilliant flashes and atmospheric artillery. "No doubt about it," Vernonia residents included among the western Oregon membership of Company 2906 decided recently, "lightning is just another way of saying 'forest fire' here."

As the result of a single thunderstorm Thursday noon

CCC men and other firefighters were kept busy throughout the nearly 2,500,000 acre protection area of the Umatilla national forest. Twenty-eight fires were brought under control within a few hours after the storm, although some of the fire locations demanded checkup well into this week to make sure of their extinction.

The sudden lightning display brought the season total of fires in the Umatilla forest to 43, said J. F. Irwin of Pendleton, forest supervisor.

Most of the blazes have been brought under control by CCC workers. A specially trained and equipped crew gets many fires before they really can start. Crew members are under instructions to be on their way within five minutes after the location of a smoke is telephoned to the camp.
