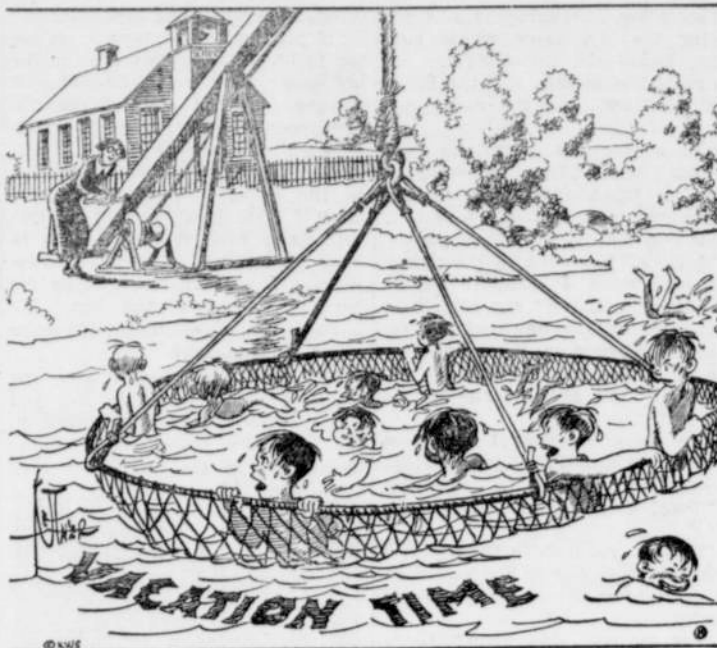

There is also a supply of kahi trousers and men's overalls in very large sizes.

There is a definite increase in relief applications this month, mainly in anticipation of winter and the end of seasonal work. As there has been no increase in the budget, these clients represent a serious problem. Many of them are drouth victims who have not established homes, and who have been following seasonal work from one vicinity to another.
