**VIEW ON SAFETY  
GIVEN BY EXPERT**

"Women are just as efficient and careful in the operation of motor vehicles as men." Such was

the statement of R. W. Haven, member of the Chicago staff of the National Safety Council, in a radio interview conducted by Sarl Snell, secretary of state, recently.

Based on years of observance of drivers and on investigation of many accidents, Mr. Haven's conclusions provide an answer to the motorage question that is advanced from time to time by ardent or partisan champions of both sexes as to their respective qualifications as drivers. Other points stressed by the

safety expert in answer to questions of secretary Snell were his belief that inattention is the major cause of accidents, that adequate policing is more essential than a fixed speed limit, and that uniformity in laws in the various states is an important factor in the safety program.

Of the three "E's" of highway safety, enforcement, engineering and education which

are emphasized in the safety council's program, Mr. Haven holds education the most important, although he believes all three are necessary for success in accident elimination. Instruction in safety in the schools is included in the council's plan and it is advocated that accident prevention be a part of the regular curriculum in every school.

A five-year program has been inaugurated by the council, according to Mr. Haven, the objective to be a 35 per cent reduc-

tion in all accidents during the period. The cooperation of the Oregon department in this program has been assured by the secretary of state.

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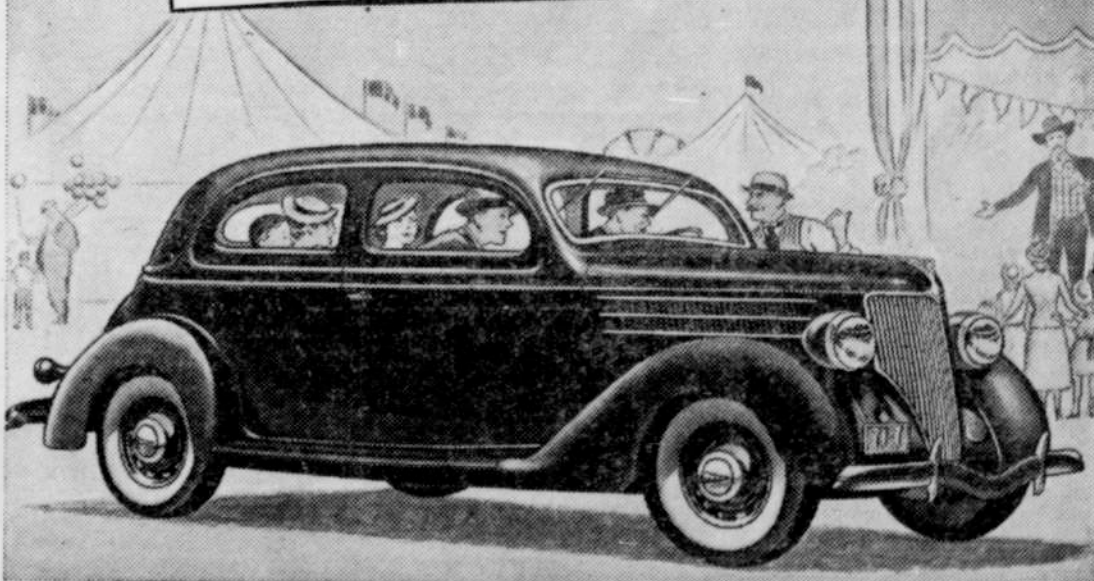
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
