First U. S. Typewriter Displayed

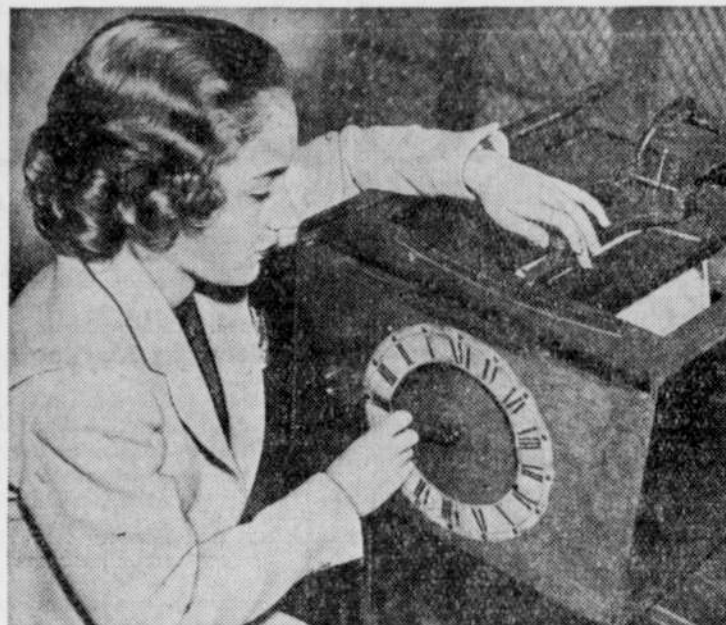
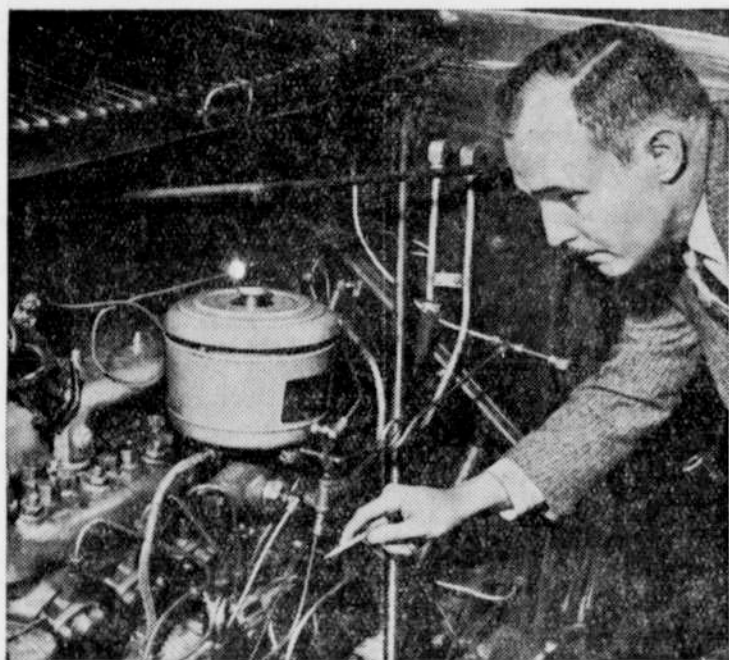
