COYOTE PELTS BROUGHT TO ST. HELENS

Four coyote pelts were brought into St. Helens by Chester Hight, government trapper from the U. S. biological survey office, who has been working in Columbia county for a short time on the trapping and poisoning of coyotes which have been destroying

poultry, sheep and goats in Columbia county.

Some \$250 losses were reported by A. A. Schwab of Deer Island from loss of turkeys and sheep killed by coyotes, and also heavy losses of turkeys were experienced by Loren Johnson at Scappoose. Other losses have been reported in the Goble district where Mr. Hight has been working. In several of the places, while no coyotes were found, farmers have reported that they do not hear them howling at night as formerly so no doubt many more coyotes were destroyed than were found as it is often difficult to locate them after they are poisoned where the brush and weeds are thick.

Mr. Hight will be in the county for a short time after the first of the year and will cooperate in trapping coyotes in any of the communities where they may be having losses of livestock if the parties concerned will report their desire for this help to the county agent's office.
