### FARMERS ARE HELPED

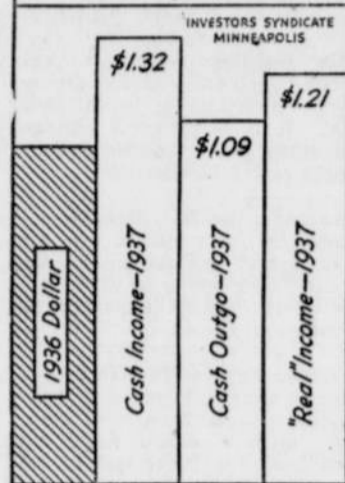
County Farm Debt Adjustment committees are playing an important role in the rehabilitation of rural life by helping farmers and their creditors arrange settlement of excessive debts and in recommending adjustments which will make farm foreclosures unnecessary.

These committees are composed of members who are impartial to the suggestions of either side. The farmer's problems are analyzed and a farm plan is worked out to the satisfaction of both debtor and creditor. Oftentimes an extension of time or the refinancing of the obligation is the satisfactory solution.

### American Income Rises 32 Cents; Living Costs Gain 9 Cents In Year

#### PURCHASING POWER March, 1937, Compared with March, 1936



THE above chart, illustrating the extent to which the average American has benefited from the rise in national income during the last twelve months, is based upon the monthly consumers' study of Investors Syndicate, of Minneapolis. For every dollar in the pockets of Mr. and Mrs. Public in March 1936, there was, thanks to improved income of every classification, \$1.32 in March 1937.

At the same time, the outgo for March 1937 was only \$1.09 compared with \$1 a year earlier, which put Mr. and Mrs. Public 21 cents ahead on every dollar of earnings. This increase in "real" income represents the average of the total dollar incomes involved in the following gains per dollar: investors, 47 cents on every dollar; wage earners, 34 cents; salaried workers, 14 cents; and other income, 51 cents.

Rents were up 13 cents on every dollar last March as compared with the same month of 1936; food rose seven cents, miscellaneous items were up nine cents, and clothing advanced two cents.

### DRIVERS LICENSES EXPIRE JUNE 30 IS ANNOUNCEMENT

All motor vehicle drivers' licenses expire June 30th of this year according to an announcement from the secretary of state.

Those who have reached the age of 70 years, those who have

acquired any physical handicaps which might affect their driving ability, and those who are applying for a driver's license for the first time must all complete the driver's license examination, states Wm. Hammond, head of the Operators Division.

The department is anticipating the recording of the greatest number of licenses known in the history of the state. This is based on the increased registration of motor vehicles, non-resident visitors, and the many who have recently taken up residence in this state.

Arrangements are being made to accept applications by May 15th in order that the remen-

dous rush and jam might be avoided. Special attention during this early period will also be given those who have reached the age of 70 or are otherwise required to take the full examination, and the department in pointing out the conveniences of applying early for license renewals. Straight renewals upon approved forms may be had by mailing the completed form together with the \$1.00 fee direct to the Secretary of State.
