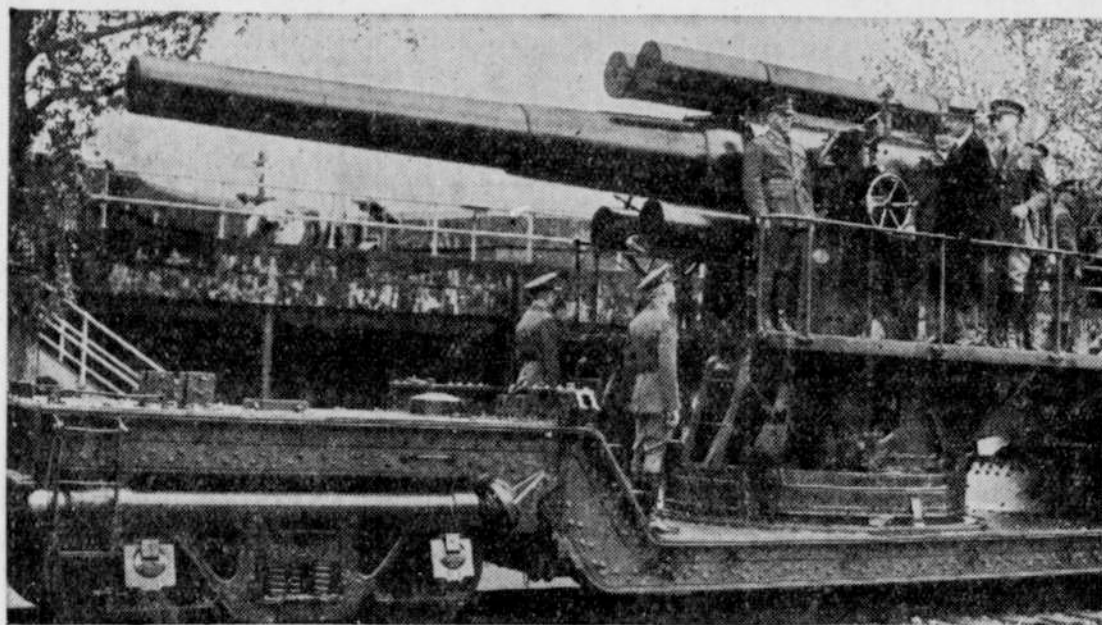
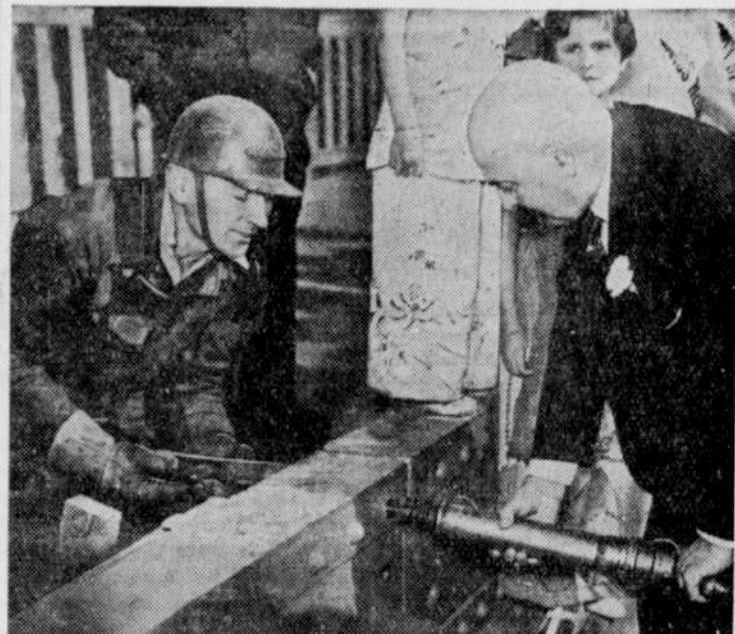


Congressmen Inspect Heavy Artillery Trains

"Attractometer" Takes Guesswork Out of Love



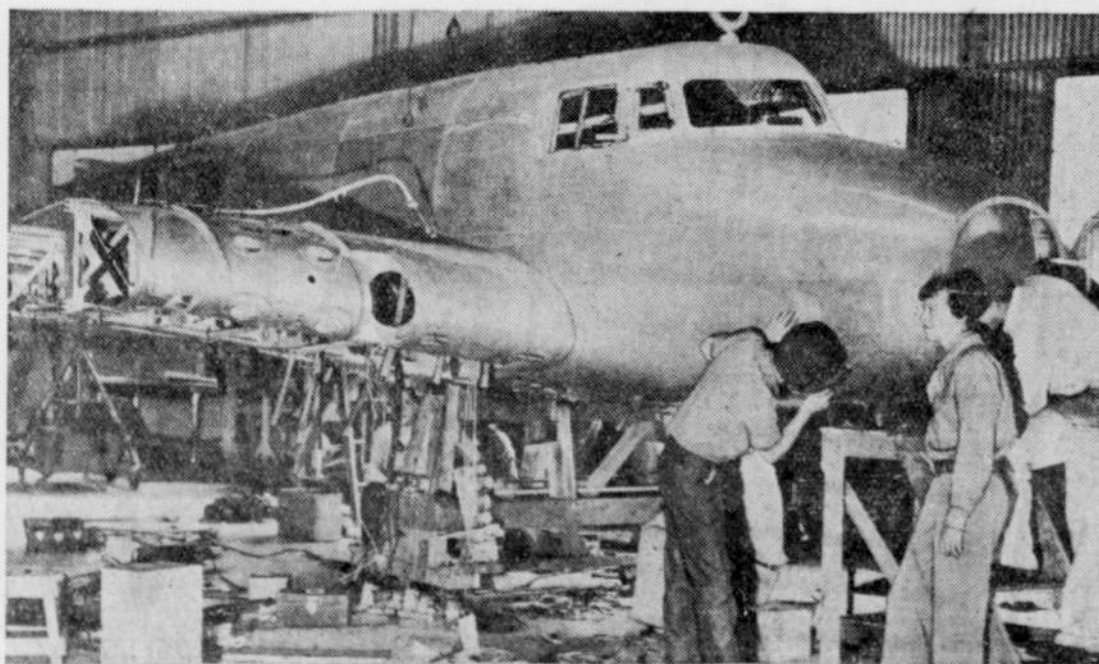
