C.M.S. GIVES MISSIONARY BREAKFAST AND PROGRAM

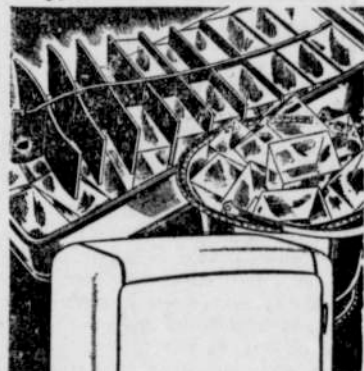
