Air Meet to Be Held From Local Airport

The two largest airplanes owned in Oregon will be on the Vernonia airport Sunday, August 15 to carry passengers and make sightseeing flights to the Oregon coast. There will also be a four passenger Cessna in the fleet.

The Travel Air flown by L. J. Sohler is a seven passenger cabin monoplane powered with a Wright Whirlwind motor. A 40-B Boeing air mail plane will be here also flown by Bob Alexander and a four passenger Cessna monoplane flown by Billy Nole. The Travel Air and Boeing are from Portland. The Cessna will be flown to Vernonia from Astoria.

Mr. Sohler has been doing a considerable amount of flying

for the U. S. Forest Service in developing methods of dropping supplies to fire camps and also in doing patrol flying. Supplies were dropped recently to a fire camp in Siskiyou mountains. All types of supplies have been dropped without damage including foodstuffs, bread, canned goods, bedding, radios, and even eggs. Different tools have also been dropped including axes, shovels, and saws. A parachute devised from a burlap wool sack is used.

All of the pilots coming to Vernonia Sunday have been flying for many years and have carried a large number of passengers. Mr. Sohler has made arrangements with the Vernonia airport committee to bring the airplanes in and also to have the airport put in condition.

Seeding of Cutover Lands Proves Success

Seeding of cut-over lands for pasture as evidenced in a tract of from 600 to 700 acres near Birkenfeld appears to be very successful, states Albert Childs, who attended a demonstration sponsored by County Agent Geo. A. Nelson and other agricultural officers Tuesday. The area was seeded under the direction of the Astoria Experiment station. The largest plot was seeded with a mixture, while there were other acres with one variety of seed each. Absence of weeds was noticeable, Mr. Childs said, and the grass was thriving. 95 head of cattle were being pastured there.
