was formally started when the pair cut the first notch for cross-arms in one of the poles to be erected on the \$15,000 extension.

More than 100 families will have power available for the first time when the extension is completed about November 1, according to R. R. Easter, Pepco division manager at Hillsboro.

The project will open up the largest area yet remaining without electricity in Washington county.
