PRESSURE BROUGHT TO BEAR ON PARK QUESTION

(St. Helens Sentinel-Mist) J. D. Perry left Thursday for Salem to help to bring action on the proposal of having the state set aside 5.64 acres of virgin

timber two miles north of Big Eddy as a state park.

Perry intended to personally contact Gov. Charles Martin on the question. Several letters from organizations and individuals have also gone to Salem asking for action on the proposal.

The effort to secure the park is sponsored by the Pomona grange of Columbia county. The tract designated adjoins a tract of almost similar size which belongs to the Natal grange. It is located on the bank of the Nehalem river.

The Pomona has offered to deed its property over to the state if it be made into a state park. Timber belongs to Clark and Wilson.

If the proposal is accepted it will be the only state park within the boundaries of Columbia county.

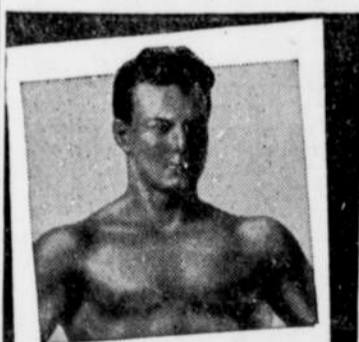
