CAUTION AFTER DARK STRESSED FOR SAFETY

Although it's the part of common sense to drive more slowly after dark, many motorists do not observe even this elementary rule of safety, Secretary of State Earl Snell said today. Caution after dark is one of the chief points stressed by Snell in carrying on a statewide campaign to make the autumn months the safest instead of the most dangerous quarter of the year.

A survey made by a branch of the Michigan highway department showed that motorists actually throttle their speed very little during the night hours, Snell said. The lowest average speed, recorded between midnight and 3 a. m., was 40 miles per hour. All authorities are agreed that 40 miles an hour is a reasonable maximum for driving at any hour of the night, Snell commented.

Combined with the fact that daylight hours are much shorter in the fall and winter than during spring and summer, this tendency of drivers to roll merrily into the night without slackening speed is a heavy contributor to fall accidents, which last year took the lives of 133 Oregonians between October 1 and

December 31, according to Snell's statistics. This death list was 37 per cent of the total for the entire year.

Realization of the importance of these facts and definite action to curtail autumn speed, will be the responsibility of every driver in Oregon of this state is to show the way in cutting the last-quarter toll, Snell declared.

Red Cross Replaces Farm Family Losses

The Red Cross gave agricultural rehabilitation to 10,116 farm families following the severe eastern floods of last winter. Types of aid included feed, seed, livestock, farm tools and machinery and other items essential to agricultural productivity. More than \$599,000 was expended by the organization to meet these requirements.

In addition to occupational assistance, rural families hard hit by the flood waters were rescued, clothed, fed and sheltered by the Red Cross. Where it was necessary the Red Cross repaired and rebuilt out-buildings, barns and other structures. Medical and nursing care were provided and homes refurnished.

Red Cross agricultural rehabilitation benefited nearly three times as many families as received all other types of Red Cross occupational rehabilitation combined.

Last year the Red Cross introduced an accident check list to 7,000,000 American homes. The list told how hazards in the home might be eliminated and the work of inspection was done by householders themselves. A like program of home accident prevention is being conducted this year.
