

Old-Time Resident Dies In Portland

Mrs. Johannah Smith Passes After Brief Illness; Came Here in Early Days

Funeral services were conducted Monday, January 24, at 2 p. m. in St. Mark's Lutheran church in Portland for Mrs. Johannah Smith, who died Thursday at 4:30 p. m. at the Emanuel hospital after a brief illness. She had been sick but a week.

Rev. T. A. Schoenberg officiated at the last rites. Mrs. Ann Johnstone sang "Till We Meet Again" and "Beautiful Isle of Somewhere". Interment was in the family plot in Lincoln Memorial Park.

Obituary

Johannah Helquist was born in Sogndal, Norway, November 12, 1863, and came to Chicago and was married to John Smith May 17, 1882. The family moved to Portland June 16, 1883, and lived there until moving to the Upper Nehalem valley in August 1889. The family returned to Portland in September 1919. Eight children were born of the union, two of whom preceded their mother in death.

Mrs. Smith was one of the early pioneers of that time who migrated to this valley when it remained as a wilderness and through many hardships aided in settling and building this section of Oregon.

She was a lifelong member of St. Mark's Lutheran church in Portland and had taken an active part in the work until advent of failing years. She was a member of Rebekah Lodge No. 196 and a member of the Gold Star Mothers.

She is survived by her six children: Rose Hienan and Garfield Smith of Portland, Gladys Peterson of St. Helens, Roy Smith of Columbia City, Inez Powell and Ben Smith of Vernonia; two sisters, Elizabeth Machelson of Hazel Run, Minnesota; and Mallina Hanson of Chicago, Illinois. Thirteen grandchildren, DeLass and Melvin Powell; Helen, Leonard and Jack Peterson; Hazel and Edwin Elmer Smith, Ronald, Kenneth, Delmer, Beverly and Wayne Milton Smith; and one great granddaughter, DeAnna Powell, survive.

200 Gather For OCF Meet Friday Night

Three Speakers Outline Current Political Situation, Trends During Evening

A crowd of 160 men and 40 women gathered Friday evening at the Washington grade school to hear three prominent speakers, members of the Oregon Commonwealth Federation, speak on current political issues and explain the purpose of the organization.

Sandwiched between the speeches was a showing of movies depicting the bombing of Shanghai. The pictures were under the auspices of "Oregon Friends of China."

Speakers included Monroe Sweetland, secretary of the OCF, who briefly outlined the policies and aims of the organization.

Peter Zimmerman, well known legislator from Yamhill, was present and explained the current power issues and told those present how the districts were being organized to take advantage of the Bonneville project.

The featured speaker of the evening was Dr. Shattuck, OCF lecturer, who framed his address around current political issues.

Following the evening's program, those interested interviewed the speakers and had questions answered by them.

Donaugh Is After Bigger Appropriation

Says Oregon "Forgotten State" as Far as Defense Money Is Concerned

Oregon is the forgotten state in the national defense program and the time has come for the state to press its demands in Congress for adequate defense, according to U. S. District Attorney Carl C. Donaugh, president of the Columbia defense league and now a candidate for the democratic senate nomination. Since the war California has obtained \$330,000,000 and Washington \$135,000,000 in army and navy establishments. Oregon only \$2,867,000. The government is spending \$250,000,000 on its two Columbia river dam projects and it is logical with the present up-building of the region that stronger defense for the notoriously undeveloped Columbia area should be immediately obtained, Donaugh continued. Donaugh advocates immediate increase of defense facilities at Fort Stevens and Tongue Point.

Hood River Paper Winner Of "Best" Prize

McMinnville Telephone Register Second; Vale Enterprise First in its Class

The Hood River News, published by Hugh G. Ball and E. A. Sonnichsen, was announced at the Oregon Press Conference held at the University of Oregon, January 20, 21 and 22, as winner of the annual Sigma Delta Chi contest for the best weekly newspaper in the state. By winning the journalism fraternity's award for the third time, the cup now belongs permanently to the Hood River paper. Second by a narrow margin was the McMinnville Telephone Register, also a twice winner of the trophy. Third place went to the Redmond Spokesman, a top-ranking paper for many years.

The Hal E. Hoss memorial award for the best paper in towns of less than 1,000 was won by the Vale enterprise, published by A. H. Bone. The Junction City Times ranked second, and the Moro Journal was third. Announcement of awards was made at the banquet by William Lammo, contest chairman for Sigma Chi. Papers were judged by Bruce McCoy, of the Louisiana state editorial association, a nationally known expert. He rated the Oregon entrants very highly and warmly commended the publishers.

Unemployed Warned to Report Back

Adherence to Rules of State Will Get Action for Applicants, Announced

Richard Bushman, Oregon State Unemployment Service representative, stated Wednesday that applicants should watch closely the rules and regulations set up for their reporting at the headquarters if they would enjoy speedy action on their claims.

If the slip given the applicant is dated on Monday, the applicant should report back the following Monday. A similar warning was issued for Wednesday and Friday. The importance of this rule was stressed by Bushman.

If the applicant goes to work on the day he is supposed to report, he should send word to the office and he need have no fear but that his claim will be cared for. Errors in claims should be reported at once, Bushman said. Hours, until further notice, are from 9 to 3:30 on Monday, Wednesday and Friday.

Exam Announced

The United States Civil Service Commission has announced an open competitive examination for the position of elevator conductor. The entrance salary is \$1,080 a year, less a retirement deduction of 3 1/2 per cent. Applicants must have had within the past 10 years, at least 3 month's experience in operating elevators. They must have reached their eighteenth but must not have passed their fiftieth birthday.
