Jones Lumber Co. Men Said Led Back to Federation Under Ex-Convict's Hand

TO THE EDITOR:

For some time Vernonia local has protested the violent acts of the Teamster's union and other A. F. of L. leaders. While making these protests and telling the public of some of the violence they resorted to we have been booted and told we were just playing for sympathy. At last these goons went too far in bombing a cleaning establishment in the city of Portland. This caused the city officials to realize they had to quit protecting these gangsters and crack down on some of them. When the police really tried it was found that they could uncover a lot of this violence. Also they found that a good portion of the violence was instigated by the teamsters.

SURVEY SHOWS FIGURES CONCERNING POWER

required to amortize the necessary investment and pay off the bonds, power rates could be considerably reduced giving an immediate benefit to the taxpayers. Likewise, as has been done in other municipalities, a portion of the profits could be used toward maintaining streets and building new civic projects such as modern street lighting, thus doing away with considerable taxation which the citizens have been bearing.

The points brought out in the above report concern for the most part the economic advantage of a municipally owned diesel electric plant. However, there is another point which can not be evaluated in terms of dollars and cents, but which must also be considered. This is the insurance that a power plant offers to a community when it is located right in the community. When electricity is obtained from a source of supply quite distant from the place of consumption it involves long transmission lines with the resulting danger from falling trees. For these reasons a community can feel independent and perfectly secure with their source of power close at hand instead of so remote. Many cities throughout the Middle West have realized thousands of dollars in savings in time of flood by having their own power plant, built on high ground, to maintain power service when transmission lines from large central plants in the bigger

If it were not feasible or did not seem the practical thing to do I would advise you against the installation of your own municipally owned diesel electric plant for the reflection it would cast on me and on the diesel industry at large in future years. However, it is obvious that this is another case where such a plant is the only logical permanent solution to your power problem.

Crae stated. Teachers aside from MacDonald and McCrae, who will be offered "return engagements" in the local Union High School setup are:

Miss Freda Beck, commercial subjects, home economics, and director of the Timberline and annual; Miss Evelyn Cook, social science and dramatic advisor; Miss Amy Hughes, music, orchestra and glee clubs; Harold McEntire, mathematics and library; Ray Mills, science and science club; Leslie Skuzie, commercial subjects and radio club advisor; Miss Jane Wilkinson, junior and senior English and public speaking, and Miss Mary Louise Miller, freshman and sophomore English and handiwork club advisor.

An important feature of the meeting was the vote to boost teachers' salaries substantially. The figures were upped from 6 to 10 per cent. Where five ranges existed prior, the next year will see but two ranges. Salaries of \$100 and \$102 monthly were boosted to \$110; \$105 and \$109 monthly to \$115. One salary remained at \$130 due to a change in duties. The figures are based on the 12-month period. Oscar Weed, recently named to the board to succeed H. M. Condit, resigned, attended his first meeting and was sworn in.
