Proclamation

Oregon has a special interest in the observance of the period between 14 and 21 May at National Air Mail week, and it therefore gives me great pleasure to urge our citizens to participate in the nationwide observance of the 20th anniversary of air mail in this country.

Due to the great distance in the West air mail service tends to overcome the gap of such distances by reduction of time and speed of travel, making it beneficial to the entire community.

The conquering of distance by time is perhaps more greatly emphasized in Oregon and on the west coast than in any other part of the country. Within the memory of living men, the time of travel from the Missouri river to Oregon was reckoned in months. Today the air mail service covers this same distance, over which the pioneers suffered hardships, in the short time of approximately one-half day. This marvelous achievement tells vividly of the importance of air mail in our economic and cultural life.

Civic Group Decides Against Meet

Power Discussion to Be Left to Sponsoring Parties, Directors Say Wednesday

The Vernonia Chamber of Commerce board of directors decided last Wednesday evening to withdraw plans previously and tentatively made to sponsor a meeting in the community at which opposing groups on the proposed 7-county utility district would appear.

Considerable discussion was held Wednesday evening during the meeting and following the examination of efforts of both factions, the directors felt that the arguments were being cared for in as thorough a fashion as is possible and will leave the dissemination of the material at hand up to the voters residing in the proposed district.

Columbia Rates First in Safety Rolls

At the close of the second month of 1938, Columbia county held first place among Oregon's 10 Group I counties on the basis of improvement over 1937 in traffic accidents, injuries and deaths, Secretary of State Earl Snell reported this week.

Last month this county was ranked first also. Counties in Group I placed in the following order for their improvement during January and February: Columbia, Washington, Clackamas, Multnomah, city of Portland, Marion, Benton, Yamhill, Clatsop and Polk.

Tillamook county placed first among the seven Group II counties and Deschutes among the eight Group III counties.

During January and February this year there were 31 accidents, 17 injuries and no deaths reported for this county.
