### Arcadia Reduced To Ashes

#### Spectacular Fire Levels Elaborate Dance Pavilion Tuesday Evening

The large, elaborate, rustic dance pavilion, lounge and kitchen, pride of Arcadia park, four miles from Vernonia on Timber route, passed out of this sphere Tuesday evening shortly after 9 o'clock in a fanfare of blazing glory, somewhat akin to its skyrocket fame which it had known some seven or eight years ago, shortly after its opening.

The only difference between the glory was that in opening the large, log building, with its rustic and impressive fire places was to house life . . . and lots of it . . . but in its end the life was short, and three hours after the first flicker, taught but desolation hovered near.

No cause for the blaze was established. General consensus had it that incendiaryism was to blame. Neighbors said that they had seen a strange light, as if a flashlight, beaming hither and yon nearby shortly before the building flamed. Following the fire there was little evidence remaining upon which to base any statement of the fire's cause.

If the building was insured, no one locally appeared to know of it. Though its owner during the park's balmy days was known to many, there appeared at the present time to be some question as to the legal owner due to mortgages and other legal entanglements reported to be enmeshed in the structure.

Neighbors said that six weeks had passed since a caretaker had resided in the building. It had not been used for two years as a pavilion. Shortly after construction (its cost was variously estimated at \$7,100 to \$12,000) the building knew a flourishing business but problems arose which complicated its management and though tries were made, patronage was slim, and thus it was that the spacious building was closed two years ago.

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### County Clerk Tabulates Voters' Registration in 32 Precincts

An interesting bit of tabulation by County Clerk Hunt was unearthed this week by The Eagle when the reports of the various voters' registration was perused.

A total of 9,616 persons have registered for voting in the May primary, the figures show. There were three progressives counted in the total, two Prohibitionists, 21 Socialists and 117 miscellaneous. The Democrats have the nod over the Republicans in Columbia county, 4,887 to 4,586.
