### St. Helens--

**THREE VACANCIES—**  
The resignation of F. D. Hollister, Miss Alice Thorsen and Miss Margaret Lacy left three vacancies to be filled in the St. Helens school faculty for the coming school year of 1938-1939.

Fred J. Patton, superintendent of St. Helens public school system, was re-elected unanimously by the board. Patton has served in his present position since 1936. Francis Gill will continue to serve as principal.

### LAST YEAR'S TERMS—

A continuation of last year's labor agreement between the Pacific Coast Pulp and Papermill Employees association and Pacific coast employers was agreed upon by both parties May 1, according to reports received here Tuesday.

In the agreement signed last year, if either party did not wish a continuation for any reason, the other was to be notified by May 1, 1938. Friendly letters of satisfaction were exchanged this year.

### PORTLANDER SUCCUMBS—

J. E. Deust, 49, of Portland, dropped dead at the wheel of his automobile Sunday on the highway just opposite Honeyman's ranch.

Deust, his wife and daughter, were returning from an outing at Seaside. When he slumped over, his wife grabbed the wheel and managed to stop the car without serious damage. Dr. Arthur Canfield and a fellow physician, who were passing, stopped to offer their aid. Deust was dead when they reached him.

### AWARDED FOUR PRIZES—

Mrs. Frank Gardner of this city was awarded four prizes in the News-Telegram-Meier & Frank trout derby recently held in Portland.

### TAKE FOUR HEAD—

The first cases of cattle theft in several years were reported this week by Mike Steudler and Paul Ryser of Deer Island after they had conducted a several days' search over this territory for four cows that were thought to have strayed.

After a careful investigation it was decided that the cows had probably been removed from the flooded pasture, by barge, into the river—taken ashore away from the owners' land and slaughtered for the market.

Merchants who buy beef are asked to cooperate with the state by refusing to buy beef that does not bear the state stamp or a sheriff's tag.

Plans are near completion for the annual St. Helens flower show to be held at the high school Wednesday, June 15, according to an announcement made this week by Mrs. C. H. Maginnis. The show will be open both afternoon and evening, from 2 to 9 p. m.

### AGAINST ST. HELLION DAYS—

Although a petition signed by 75 business and professional men was presented to the chamber of commerce last week asking them to continue with St. Hellion Days, the matter was dropped for good at a meeting of the board of directors held Monday night.

When the signers of the petition were asked to underwrite the celebration, a majority of them were not in favor and the chamber decided it was not in the position to undertake the financial risk alone.

#### SEASON STARTS—

The 1938 commercial fishing season opened on the Columbia river Sunday night at 6 p. m. with the prices and wage scales agreed upon for the coming season.

The catches were well up to normal for the season's opening the best fishing, according to all reports, centered near Mayger where one cannery reported an average catch of 423 pounds.

No exceptional catches were made below Tongue Point but most of the gillnetters with small meshed nets had from 200 to 400 pounds.

#### EASTER SUNDAY WETTEST—

Easter Sunday was the wettest day of April this year. In spite of this fact there was 5.69 inches less rainfall in the month this year than that of last year.

### Rainier--

#### MEMBERSHIP DRIVE—

With the two teams ferreting out every eligible business man or citizen in the community who ought to belong and doesn't, or who has neglected to keep his dues from falling in arrears, the Rainier Commercial club is nearing the end of its membership drive for this year.

#### LUMBER SHIPMENTS MADE—

Over a million and one-half feet of lumber were shipped from the Clark and Wilson mill at Prescott over the weekend. After spending two days at the plant docks, the S. S. Dorothy Phillips completed loading 1,041,000 feet for San Pedro and Long Beach Sunday evening. The S. S. Astoria docked there Friday and took on 565,000 feet for San Diego and San Pedro.

#### TO PILOT AIRMAIL—

Wilbur J. Smith, air-minded mayor of Rainier, will make a special flight between here and the Swan Island airport in Portland as a feature of national air mail week.

L. O. Cobb, superintendent of the mails at Longview, announced Tuesday that Smith had agreed to make the trip on behalf of the Washington city. Cobb said he saw no reason why air mail from Rainier could not be included in the cargo.

#### RATES TARGET OF CITY—

Two ordinances, aimed at reduction of Rainier's fire insurance rate, were introduced to the council and read the first and second times Monday evening. One ordinance is a building code and the other deals with fire prevention. The latter provides for regular inspection of property within the fire zone by a special marshal. It is expected that Fire Chief William Joseph will serve in this capacity at a small salary to be set later.
